
a) EVENTUALLY, ALL WHITE MEN COULD VOTE

FOUR ROLES OF SOCIAL MOVEMENTS By Bill Moyer, April 7, 1999

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Promotes positive American values, principles and symbols, e.g., democracy, freedom, justice, nonviolence.</li> <li>• Normal citizen</li> <li>• Grounded in the center of society.</li> <li>• Promotes active citizen-based society where citizens act with disinterest to assure the common good.</li> <li>• The active citizen is the source of legitimate political power.</li> <li>• Acts on "confirmatory bias" concept.</li> <li>• Examples: King &amp; Mandela</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Parliamentary: Use official mainstream system &amp; institutions, e.g., courts, Congress, city hall, corporations to get the movement's goals, values.</li> <li>• alternatives adopted into official laws, policies &amp; conventional wisdom.</li> <li>• Use a variety of means: lobbying, law-suits, referenda, rallies, candidates, etc</li> <li>• Professional Opposition Organizations (POOs) are the key movement agencies.</li> <li>• Watchdog successes to assure enforcement, expand successes, &amp; protect against backlash.</li> <li>• POOs nurture &amp; support grassroots</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• POOs: Dominator/patriarchal model of organizational structure &amp; leadership. Organizational maintenance over movement needs. Dominator style undermines movement democracy and disempowers grassroots.</li> <li>• POO "Realistic Politics": Promotes minor reforms rather than social change.</li> <li>• POO cooptation: Staff identify more with official powerholders than with movement grassroots.</li> </ul>
<p><b>CITIZEN</b></p> <p><b>REBEL</b></p> <p><b>Effective</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Protest: Say, "NO" to violations of positive, widely-held human values.</li> <li>• Nonviolent direct action &amp; attitude, demonstrations, rallies &amp; marches, including civil disobedience.</li> <li>• Target: Powerholders &amp; their institutions, e.g., government, corporations.</li> <li>• Puts issue &amp; policies in public spotlight &amp; on society's agenda.</li> <li>• Actions have strategy &amp; tactics</li> <li>• Empowered, exciting, courageous, risky, center of public attention.</li> <li>• Hold relative, not absolute, truth.</li> </ul>	<p><b>CHARGE AGENT</b></p> <p><b>REFORMER</b></p> <p><b>Effective</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Organize People Power &amp; the Engaged Citizenry creating participatory democracy for the common good;</li> <li>• Educate &amp; involve the majority of citizens &amp; whole society on the issue.</li> <li>• Involve pre-existing mass-based grassroots organizations, networks, coalitions &amp; activists on the issue.</li> <li>• Promote strategies &amp; tactics for waging long-term social movement &amp; Stage 6.</li> <li>• Create &amp; support grassroots activism &amp; organizations for the long-term.</li> <li>• Put issue on society's <i>political</i> agenda.</li> <li>• Counter powerholder new strategies</li> <li>• Promote alternatives.</li> </ul>	<p><b>Ineffective</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Too Utopian: promote visions of perfectionistic alternatives in isolation from practical political &amp; social action.</li> <li>• Promote only minor reforms.</li> <li>• Movement leadership &amp; organizations based on patriarchy &amp; control, rather than participatory democracy.</li> <li>• Tunnel vision: advocate single issue activists.</li> <li>• Ignore personal issues and needs of activists.</li> <li>• Unconnected to social &amp; political social change and paradigm shift.</li> </ul>

# THE WESTERN SYSTEM OF THIRD-WORLDIZATION

## The Global System of Industrial Nations' Development and Third World Exploitation

### NORTH

- CAPITAL
  - Aid loans & Credits. (Since early 1980s, net flow from South to North.)
  - Multinational corporate investments (little new money, mostly re-invested profits)

Industrialized Nations      Virtually all capital goes to create infrastructure of South's export economies.

• Mostly aids the foreign and domestic corporate and owning classes, while actually harming the poor majority.

#### ■ MANUFACTURED GOODS & SERVICES

• These mostly go to the affluent minority.

#### ■ MILITARY EQUIPMENT, TRAINING AND INTERVENTION

• Supports dictatorships & police states against poor majority.

• Massive military equipment sales laid.

#### ■ ENVIRONMENTAL DESTRUCTION

• Policies, programs, and materials that destroy and pollute the environment & endanger people.

• Dictates/controls political, economic environmental, social policy of Third World nations.
